That was until an obstacle so large came along that she could not shield me from the harshness of life.

Near the end of my freshman year, our family had to move out of our house due to a large increase in rent. Since then, I have been living with my grandmother in her one-bedroom house with my mother, sister and our dog. We rotated between sleeping on an air mattress, the couch, and the living room floor. In October of my junior year, things got worse. My mother lost her job of 17 years because the company she worked for went out of business. We had no home and no source of income for about one year. Recently my mother found employment, and my sister moved out. However, my mom and I still live with my grandmother. Seeing my family dynamic change overnight is what keeps me motivated to attend a four-year college, make a name for myself, and gain my own financial stability.

I was introduced to **achieve** when I was 7 or 8 years old. My older sister is an **achieve** alumna, and I always used to see her in her Holy Names High School uniform. Oddly enough, at that young age I knew that I wanted to attend Holy Names regardless of the fact that it is an all-girls' school. I remember going to **achieve** family meetings with my mother and sister

and hearing **achieve** staff talk about important things. I did not yet realize that they would become important to me later in life and that eventually, I would step into my sister's shoes.

When the time came for me to apply to Holy Names, my mother told me not to get my hopes up too high; if I did not receive the **achieve** Scholarship, there would be no way that she could afford a private school

tuition. Fortunately, I was given the chance of a lifetime; **achieve** stayed true to their vision and opened my first door of opportunity.

I had to work ten times harder than my peers just to catch up. Although it was difficult fitting in, I learned to accept myself and

embrace my identity through the help of my Vietnamese church community and its rich traditions. In gratitude for the love my community has shown me, I dedicate a lot of my time to the community by playing piano for mass, serving as lector, and singing.

Going through elementary and middle school with little guidance was very difficult, so I had no idea how I would make it through high school and college. My prayers were answered when the acceptance letter from achieve arrived at my front door.

Because of **achieve**, I was able to attend a great school with a community that made me feel accepted and represented. Many in my classes were also immigrants and first-generation students, so I no longer felt alone.

I was introduced to many new things because of the Program. Through the numerous cultural events all the achieve students attended, I was exposed to the expressive culture of theater. During my achieve summer internships, I was able to explore parts of the working-world that were foreign to me, which helped to cultivate and solidify my passion for healthcare and research. And as a first-generation college student, I would have been lost in the college search and application process had it not been for the guidance from **achieve**.

I hope to continue my education and pursue more opportunities along the path to achieving my dream. Inspired by achieve's goal of giving back to the community, I hope to return to Vietnam and help women who do not have the means to care for their health, just as someone once helped my mother. As I reflect on my life these past 18 years, I recognize that many people have helped me along my journey so far. I will carry what I have been given and make sure to pass on the same love and kindness to others.

# PURSUE THE IMPOSSIBLE

Growing up in the San Francisco Bay Area, I went to mediocre public schools, excelling in academics but not focusing on my future. As a first-generation, low-income student with a passion for science, I sought to be an astronomer or astrophysicist but did not think about the means needed to pursue it. The most I thought I would achieve would be a public high school education, followed by City College, and later somehow a career in the sciences. The high cost of everything made luxuries such as a private education seem like an impossibility. However, that prospect became a possibility when my grandma asked me about attending Archbishop Riordan High School through an achieve Scholarship.

When I started Riordan, I essentially entered a foreign environment blind. I struggled to make friends because of my introverted tendencies. However, because of my ability to play the flute, I was able to join the ARHS Band community, which enabled me to make friends and truly acclimate. Shortly enough, what seemed like a foreign environment had grown to be familiar. By sophomore year, I ventured to get more involved and joined the Crusader Newspaper, the History Bowl, and became a member of the National Honors Society. With increased participation, I truly discovered what I would call home for the next four years.

Along with my adventures at Riordan, I was involved in many activities as a part of the achieve Program. From the summer school preceding high school to "college boot camp," achieve gave me multiple unforgettable experiences that assisted me throughout high school and toward college. By far the most influential, however, were during my internships and college counseling.

I have always been interested in the sciences, specifically astronomy. During my sophomore and junior summers, I had the pleasure of interning at the California Academy of Sciences. My Planetarium internships allowed me to

delve deeper into my passions, for I was able to work behind the scenes and broaden my knowledge. In this context, I also had to do battle with my innate shyness, as I ventured far out of my area of comfort to interact with visitors on the floor. These internships were both fulfilling and unique learning experiences.

The achieve Program has urged me to pursue experiences I would not have otherwise. I heard of the Carleton Liberal Arts Experience through achieve: it was an all-expenses-

These programs helped broaden my outlook on college and motivated me throughout the college process.

One college, in particular, caught my attention—Wesleyan University in Middletown, Connecticut. It is one of the few liberal arts colleges to offer an astronomy major and a master's degree in any science. Again, thanks to achieve's help, I was able to secure a full four-year scholarship to Wesleyan through the Questbridge Match Program.

Thanks to achieve, I have gained many opportunities that I had never considered. What seemed like a distant possibility is now an approaching reality as I enroll into a prestigious university across the nation. Now I believe that I have the ideals to succeed; one of them is to always go outside your area of comfort, and the other is to never settle, but rather pursue the impossible.
