
I started in June with Orientation and an overview of what the next eight weeks would look like. I was partnered with two endocrinologists at Children's Hospital. This hit home, as I was going be working under the mentorship of doctors who studied autoimmune disorders, something that directly applies to me. Twice a week, I spent time in Zoom meetings where we would discuss different topics that were relevant to discussions taking place in the medical community. We had many interesting presenters who studied a multitude of specialties within healthcare such as chromosomal disorders, neurology, and even things like racial disparities in healthcare. In the beginning it was somewhat intimidating, the reason being that I was one of only four high school students; the rest were either starting or in college. Most of these students had already done some sort of medical research, but for me, this was completely unfamiliar. My job was to collect data on pediatric patients, looking for specific trends to find out whether or not there was a link between a thyroid

condition called Graves' Disease and the COVID-19 pandemic. The project itself was interesting, but the best part was being able to be in an office setting, working under doctors and having access to patient charts.

Over the eight weeks, I gained confidence, communication skills, and self-reassurance. Communication skills because I had to put on my big boy pants and be in close communication every day with the doctors, the medical director of the program, and my coworkers whom I had never met before. At the end of the program, during the SSRP symposium where I displayed my research project and gave small presentations to everyone who came around my poster, I realized that I had gained so much confidence from this experience. Not only was I able to clearly explain what my project was about, but I was able to have great conversations with the guests, the doctors, and other interns. This was a good feeling, and I know this will be helpful when I go off to college.

Lastly, self-reassurance was key during this period. Honestly, this program was intense, challenging, and took up many hours where I was staring at my computer doing math. But despite all of this, I had so

much fun. It reconfirmed my passion for medicine and health. It reassured me that becoming a doctor is still my goal. Having first-hand experience being at a doctor's office every day for 8 weeks, being part of medical conferences and discussions on different topics, and getting to know people who want to follow the same path was extremely rewarding. INVALUABLE LIFE LESSONS

In the vicinity of Lower Haight Street lies the Haight Street Art Center. It was there, as part of the JFCS's YouthFirst Program, that I was fortunate to have been an intern this summer. Haight Street Art Center is a non-profit organization whose mission is to bring people of all backgrounds together through art. Art is more than just paint on a canvas. Art is an image, a statement, a message, and many more things. At the Haight Street Art Center, artists are encouraged to inspire and impact both the younger and older generations with their messages. It was a safe environment where I was able to grasp a knowledge of art. Art can be powerful. It can change lives. It does not matter how other people view art. You view art the way you would like.

During the five weeks of my internship, I gained self-confidence, self-awareness, and a wealth of practical skills. I had the opportunity to learn screen printing techniques, as well as the significance of organization and computer literacy. At the Haight Street Art Center, screen printing played a vital role. We utilized screen printing to transfer one work of art onto another so that individuals might take a piece of art home with them. I had never heard of screen printing, and had no idea it was also used to make graphic t-shirts and posters. Screen printing takes time since the first attempt is rarely successful. I needed to discover a means of gaining comfort and practicing procedures. I learned from my errors. I now realize that mistakes are not a sign of failure, but rather a stepping stone to achievement.

While at the Haight Street Art Center, I was required to conduct an extensive inventory. It was my responsibility to count and organize the products, posters, and mementos on the shelves. Initially, it was quite difficult to obtain spaces for the containers, so I rearranged the storage space and devised a method for storing and organizing the containers so that people could find what they need much more quickly. I was really pleased with myself, and my boss acknowledged my efforts. This let me understand that I possess a good eye for detail. I previously believed I was

not a particularly organized person, but this showed me I was mistaken. I also realized that I am an excellent initiative

taker. If anything is wrong, I must correct it and find a solution.

The responsibility of having a job taught me invaluable life lessons. I was scared at first. I thought I would not fit in and that my coworkers were going to be rude. I have come to see that that was not true. I fit in quite well, and my fellow co-workers had an attitude that anyone could love. I now understand what it is to have personal accountability. I was required to manage my time and adhere to a schedule in order to arrive on time, since it was my responsibility to do so. Additionally, I had to ensure that my daily activities were completed in an organized manner. I had many duties, which I had to manage myself. I did not have the assistance of my parents to wake me up and explain things I should have previously known. I was required to be autonomous, but also to advocate for myself and seek assistance when necessary. This altered the way I perceive my day-to-day activities and personal life. I was not prepared for what I went through. I believed it would be simple to do my job and depart. No obligations, no stress, and no agenda. I did not anticipate having to report my own hours in order to get compensated. I did not believe that communication would be an essential requirement for employment. I have always been reluctant to ask for assistance and private about my problems. I feel like I am a new person. I feel I have achieved significant personal growth.

My internship taught me that having a job is not easy. It requires skill, knowledge, responsibility, and effort. This experience allowed me to grow as an individual, and to change my perspective on life. I was able to learn who I really am, and I will always be grateful for having had this experience. 7
